Principal's Report

As term 1 is drawing to a close, it provides an opportunity to update the School community regarding the maintenance that has been undertaken this year. These works will make Brentwood an even better place to be. I would also like to and acknowledge some outstanding achievements in the College this term.

The upgrade of A-Block classrooms is almost complete. Classrooms and access hallways have been painted and new display boards have been placed in all of the A-Block rooms. The painting and fitting of the display boards took four weeks. In this time, there were many room changes and much inconvenience to staff and students. The disruption was worth it as the rooms now look fresh, colourful and provide better spaces for classes. The Humanities staff room will be painted over the holidays.

DEECD is replacing the school's security system. Whilst parents, students and many staff will not notice the new system, we will be better able to accommodate those who need access to the school buildings outside of school hours. We should see fewer false alarms and improved security.

Builders will commence the construction of disabled facilities after the Easter break. This will involve the creation of a new facility that will include a toilet, shower and rest area to enable staff to attend more appropriately to students' needs. The current disabled facility will be converted into store rooms.

In the technology area additional sewing machines have been purchased. Over the holidays the textiles room will be extended to provide more space and better facilities for students in textile studies. The kitchen upgrade will be completed shortly, following the installation of some new benches and flooring. The new kitchen is a massive improvement on the facilities that existed previously with more space, modern refrigeration and cooking facilities which

includes new ovens, cook tops and microwave/convection ovens. The new mirror over the teacher demonstration area enables all students to see into pots and pans as the teacher demonstrates food preparation techniques, much like we see on cooking shows, such as "The Iron Chef".

The College has applied for Commonwealth funding through the Building Education Revolution (BER). A College of our size is eligible for \$200,000 under the National School Pride program of the BER. The projects that have been prioritised to be funded from this grant include modernising power switchboards, paths and garden works, painting of classrooms, extension of the woodwork room and seminar room, construction of additional outside basketball courts and completion of the shade covering over the outside learning space in the TLC.

Whilst the maintenance of the College's facilities can often keep me awake at night, it would be remiss of me not to mention some of the College's outstanding achievements this term. The most outstanding was the wonderful contribution made by all to the Bush Fire Appeal, Brentwood raised \$11,500. Our students have also performed wonderfully in interschool sport, which is commented on later in this newsletter.

In conclusion, may I remind the parents that parent/teacher interviews, which start next week, form a significant part of the academic program. Teachers do appreciate meeting parents and reporting on student progress, so we hope to see all parents at these interviews.

On Tuesday, the 3 March 2009, five new overseas students of Brentwood Secondary College attended a reception at Government House to celebrate the International Education Week. Mrs Weeraratne was wearing a sari and it looked very nice on her; the silk was flying in the wind like a butterfly. Many students from other Victorian schools were already there taking photos with the entertainers who were in colourful costumes. The Government House is like a beautiful white palace. It is surrounded by green lawns and plenty of tall trees.

What we first saw when we walked into the Government House was an old aboriginal man. He played a strange instrument called a didgeridoo which looked like a big flute. The Governor of Victoria, Professor David de Kretser, welcomed the guests and spoke about his experiences as an overseas student. The welcome speech by the Aboriginal adult was very special and interesting. Overseas students who achieved great VCE results last year also spoke about their experiences. A local student talked about the benefits of having overseas students at his school. After the meeting in the ballroom, we were invited to view the state rooms while refreshments were served. The Quartet provided entertainment with beautiful music. We also met a friend from the English language school that we had attended and chatted a lot about school life in Australia.

We also received souvenirs and took a lot of photos in the Government House. I enjoyed the experience and am thankful for being invited for the reception at Government House.

Senior Boys' Cricket

In previous editions of the newsletter, you would have read about the exploits of the senior boys' cricket team as they cast off the challenges of neighbouring schools to emerge victorious as the Waverley District champions.

Now it was time to pit ourselves against the finest that Eastern Zone had to offer, starting with Emerald Secondary College, a real gem of a

team, in the quarter finals. Playing, for the first time this campaign, on a ground of proper size, we decided to again bowl first, which was useful considering Emerald won the toss and elected to bat. Their eclectic mixture of "swing and miss" and slow defence against some sound bowling from the Brentwood boys saw them accumulate just 57 runs in their 17 overs. Nic Richards was the standout bowler with 2/6 off four overs, the highlight being a caught behind straight off the pads, whilst "Juice" Rajupaksha carved a swathe through the middle order with 2/3 off his two overs.

The boys were confident; in previous matches we had been scoring at seven or eight an over with consummate ease, so 58 seemed a small target. However, our confidence was dispatched quicker than a Bryce McGain long hop, when we lost two wickets in two balls in the second over. At 2/0 we needed salvation and it came in the form of Cohen Howell and Dave Mathers. The two batted extremely sensibly, knocking the ball into the many gaps and playing with the straightest of bats. They took us to within a boundary of victory before Dave fell for a solid 18. Our committed and passionate skipper Jack Tyrrell brought up the victory with a four, whilst Cohen finished unbeaten on 36 as we brought up the victory with over five overs to spare.

It was now time to take on Fairhills whom we knew had plenty of batsmen capable of "smoking" our bowlers all over the park and "lighting up" the scoreboard. Once again, we decided to bowl first, this time on a postage stamp, and the opposition ignited from the very first over. Despite the ardent support of Miss Bishop's girls' team, the boys found it difficult to stem the flow of runs. Bowlers were swapped around, fielders sent far and wide, but the Fairhills batsmen found the boundary with ease. After 18 overs they had amassed 7/168, a run rate of over nine an over. Cohen's artful spin bowling was again the highlight, collecting 2/18 off four overs, whilst Dean Siakoulis took an excellent running outfield catch, but the highlights were few and far between.

Our inspirational skipper Jack tried to fire the boys up, but in all reality, we had little hope of chasing down the mammoth total. Our boys went down swinging, or at least attempting to. In his first trip to the batting crease this year, Ricky Alabaster smashed three 6's on his way to 32, whilst Nic Richards compiled a determined 26 not out. We fell well short of the target, scoring 7/94 off our allotted overs. We did our best to keep the match interesting with some well aimed support coming from the boundary, but alas, it was not our day. Like Tim Henman in so many Wimbledon campaigns, our run ended in the semi finals.

Congratulations to all of the cricketers who represented Brentwood over the five matches we played, and particularly to the year 12 students who have now played their last match of cricket for the College.

Want To Study A Medical Related Course In 2010

If so, you may need to sit the Undergraduate Medicine & Health Sciences Admission Test (UMAT). This is used in the selection of students for certain Australian degrees. Eg Selection of students to study medicine at Monash University involves a combination of ENTER, UMAT and interview; pharmacy and physiotherapy at Monash use the ENTER and UMAT. The UMAT test date for 2009 is 29 July; registrations open in April. The UMAT Information Booklet will be available ONLY on line in late March. In the meantime, find the UMAT 2008 Information Booklet and other information at <http://umatweb.acer.edu.au>.

NOTE: Some University of Melbourne courses which previously required the UMAT no longer do so as they are post-graduate entry under the 'Melbourne Model' (dentistry, medicine optometry, physiotherapy). The Bachelor of Oral Health still requires the UMAT. You might consider applying interstate to increase your chances of securing a place in these competitive courses.
